Course Description	The AP Spanish Language and Culture course is a rigorous course that is taught exclusively in Spanish and approximately equivalent to a 5-university course. The course requires students to improve their proficiency across the three modes of communication (interpretive, interpersonal, and presentational).
	The course focuses on the integration of authentic resources including online print, audio, and audiovisual resources, as well as traditional print resources that include literature, essays, and magazine and newspaper articles with the goal of providing a rich, diverse learning experience. Students communicate using rich, advanced vocabulary and linguistic structures as they build proficiency in all modes of communication toward the pre-advanced level as defined in the <i>ACTFL Performance Guidelines for K-12 learners</i> .
Organization	The course is divided into thematic units which are further based on recommended contexts and guided by essential questions. Corresponding cultural elements are integrated into the study of the units, and activities are directed with those cultural connections in mind. Discussion of the topics completely in Spanish is a requirement for this course.
	It is assumed that students have previously been exposed to advanced language structures in the courses leading up to the AP Spanish Language and



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	Culture course; however, review of the mechanics is done within the contextual framework of each unit as needed.
Learning/Performance Objectives	Objective: The student will utilize knowledge of the language, enhance grammatical skills and research the country and history of Spain and other Hispanic countries. The student will be able to comprehend oral and written language and will express himself both orally and in written form using advanced vocabulary and structure. Students will improve their knowledge of the target language and prepare research and analytical papers/projects using upper-level skills. The course will follow guidelines provided by the AP syllabus as approved by the College Board.
	<b>Purpose:</b> The purpose of this course is to provide students with experience of a college-level course. The intensive reading and writing activities will allow the students to develop and refine their critical and analytical Spanish language skills needed for their participation in this global environment.
Ongoing Assignments:	<ul> <li>Oral Participation – students will contribute orally during class independently or in small group discussions.</li> <li>Diario de Vocabulario – students are required to purchase a small journal in which they will write down new vocabulary that they come across during in and out of class readings.</li> <li>Conexión Cultural – students are provided with a cultural comparison question and they must record their response in their journal and transfer it orally into a recorder. They will be timed according to AP guidelines.</li> <li>Homework – Homework includes reading / listening activities, AP reading selections, emails, and current events.</li> </ul>
Assignments per unit:	CBA Practice 1Exam – students will be assessed on essential unit vocabulary, grammar reviewed, reading, and listening.  All sections of the test will mimic and be timed as the AP exam format.  Email – students will write at least 1 in class email per unit that mimics the AP exam format.  Persuasive Essay – students will write at least one synthesis essay per unit that mimics the AP exam format.  Oral Presentation – students will make one oral presentation per unit recording it or in front of the class.  Quizzes – students will be regularly assessed on essential unit vocabulary and grammar review.

Resources:	The AP Spanish Language and Culture course will be taught using a multitude of resources to cover all aspects of the Spanish language. The primary text is <b>Temas: AP Spanish Language and Culture</b> . The authors of this text have the following to say about their creation: The textbook Temas is accompanied by an online Temas supersite. With daily practice using the digital activities, the students will improve their writing, listening and speaking skills. Primary source for communication will be K12, AP Classroom, Shmoop, Albert.io and Middlebury Interactive Languages will be used as resources through the school year.

	Major Assessments 50% Minor Assessments 30% Daily Work 20%
	The academic year is divided into four quarters, or 9 -week periods. The weight for each nine-week period will be 37.5 percent and the semester exam will weigh 25 percent. There will be a minimum of 5 grades per student during each three weeks progress report grading period. This course will be comprised of 3 grading categories: Major Assessments 50%, Minor Assessments 30%, and Daily Work 20%. There will be a minimum of 9 assessments per nine-week grading period to constitute students' course grade for that grading period.
	These assessments will minimally be comprised of 3 major assessments (valued at 50%) and 6 minor assessments (valued at 30%). There may be more than 5 grades posted during a three-week period.

Assessment Policy  Retesting Procedures	Frequently during the year, formative assessments will be given. These will be in the form of homework, written or oral quiz, readings and discussion, student writing, or tests. Feedback will be given on all formative assessments.  The formative assessments are critical to learning because they provide feedback as to what essential learning we will focus on next. They will help influence and shape the process of learning while we still have time to improve before test or grades are given.  Students may retake tests only upon receiving a failing grade of below a 70%. Additional assigned material during tutorial may be a prerequisite to taking a retest. The time and date for all retests is determined by the teacher. No penalty is assigned for the weight of retest grades. Semester Exams will not be eligible for retest.

You are responsible for all assigned homework or material presented in class.</li> <li>Check your email every day and visit the course webpage daily to stay up to date.</li> </ul>
