

Jump into the world of culinary fantasy where Camila Rojas recreates recipes from books, tv, movies, and more

In the movie *Chronicles of Narnia*, a sweet treat called Turkish Delight is presented as a bargain for one of the main characters to betray his family. Turkish delight, also known as lokum, was produced in Turkey and Iran as early as the late 18th century.

Turkish delight is a candy that resembles the texture of gum drops and is very sweet due to the main ingredients being sugar and starches. Extracts are added to contribute to the delicious taste, traditional flavors include orange, lemon, and rosewater.

Wanting to recreate the Chronicles of Narnia version, I used rosewater, but knowing that rosewater is a very acquired taste, I decided to make a separate batch using almond extract. The process is lengthy when it comes to cooking but leaves an abundance of sweetness.

Cook Time: 2.5 hours Chill Time: 4 hours

Ingredients:

4 cups sugar

- 1½ cup water
- 2 tsp lemon juice
- 1 tsp lemon zest
- 1 cup cornstarch
- 1 tsp cream of tartar
- 3 cups of water
- 2 tsp rosewater (or any extract)

Optional: red food coloring

Olive oi

½ cup powdered sugar

¼ cup cornstarch



Steps:

- 1. Pour 4 cups of sugar into a pot along with 1 ½ cups of water, 2 tsp lemon juice, and 1 tsp lemon zest.
- 2. Turn the heat to high and whisk until the mixture comes to a boil.
- 3. Lower the heat to medium-high and cook until the temperature ranges from 240-250 F.
- 4. Remove the liquid and pour a sieve into a glass jug to remove any sugar crystals.
- 5. In a bigger pot add 1 cup of cornstarch, 1 tsp of cream of tartar, and three cups of water.
- 6. Mix all the ingredients until you feel no more lumps of cornstarch, then turn the heat to high and whisk constantly until it boils.
- 7. Turn the heat to medium-low and continue whisking until it thickens.
- 8. Pour the sugar mixture bit by bit into the starch mixture to incorporate.
- 9. Continue cooking in low heat for 45 minutes stirring constantly.
- 10. Add 2 tsp of Rosewater (or any extract) and a few drops of red food coloring.
- 11. Pour the mixture into a glass casserole with cellophane rubbed down with olive oil.
- 12. Evenly distribute the mixture and put it into the fridge for 4 hours or until completely hardened.
- 13. In a bowl sift ½ cup of powdered sugar with ¼ cup of cornstarch.
- 14. Put a bit of the powder on the top of the Turkish delight and turn over the glass casserole. The delight should fall over the table.
- 15. Cover the other side with more powder, the delight will be very
- 16. Coat a knife with powder to prevent sticking, and cut the delight into small 1-inch by 1-inch pieces.
- 17. Cover the delights with more powder.

Another pass time of his is watching movies. His favorite movie is Wall-E.


Meet Bianca Olivares
